TAX FRAUD UPDATE FROM ARCHD. OF SEATTLE

Although we have not identified the specific source of the breach affecting the Archdiocese, we do know that members of our community have been the victims of a national tax fraud scheme. Indeed, approximately 5,900 individuals have informed us that they have had a fraudulent tax return filed in their name. We have confirmed that approximately 10% of those individuals **did not** provide us with a Social Security number in connection with a background check over the last nine (9) years, suggesting that there are some individuals whose information may have been compromised elsewhere. The Archdiocese has concluded its investigation, having explored the reasonable leads that we identified in our investigation. Although we have not found anything in our internal systems to suggest they were compromised, we still are committed to making sure that the responsible people are held accountable. As such, we continue to work cooperatively with law enforcement, and understand that they are continuing to investigate this incident as a high priority matter.

This type of crime is a national issue and has been escalating over the last several years. Recently, 60 Minutes did a story regarding this problem, and you can view that story on their website (<http://www.cbsnews.com/news/irs-scam-identity-tax-refund-fraud-60-minutes/>).

Many Archdiocesan volunteers and employees who's Social Security Numbers were submitted to our prior background check vendor for the purpose of having a background check have recently received an Identity Protection Personal Identification Numbers (IP PIN) from the IRS. These IP PINs help the IRS verify a taxpayer's identity and accept their electronic/paper filing, thus preventing someone else from using a stolen Social Security number to file a false return in the taxpayer's name. Accordingly, taxpayers who receive an IP PIN must use it to file their tax return. These bulletins will provide updates and action alerts on a regular basis while the legislature is in session. The regular session started on January 12th and is scheduled for 105 days. It is quite possible that an additional 30-day session will be necessary to pass the budget. Based on Catholic teaching, the WSCC is actively engaged in many issues. WSCC's 2015 legislative [priorities](#) are listed in the following categories: Life, Budget, Catholic Schools, Children & Families, Criminal Justice, Economic Justice, Environment, Health Care, Housing and Long-Term Care.

You can make a difference by contacting your two State Representatives and your State Senator on issues impacting poor and vulnerable persons, including the unborn, children, the homeless, and those with mental illness. Timing is very important, so WSCC will provide resources for you to effectively contact your legislators as they are considering an issue. Fr. Marion's Corner

ABORTION

January 22, 1973 was a sad day. 42 years ago, we legalized abortion and a total of 56,993,299 souls have been terminated and the count continues.

When the rich young man came to Jesus and asked him what must he do to gain eternal life, Jesus gave him the commandments. Interestingly, Jesus did not begin with the first commandment which is, "You shall not have strange gods before me." Neither did Jesus give the first commandment pertaining to people which is, "Honor your mother and father," but He begins with, "You shall not kill." Before we can love eternal life, we must love life. How can a Christian nation like ours not understand this simple commandment?

Even as I share with you one argument for life, you can imagine the emotions rising in the debate if another on the opposing side were present. Before we can reach those outside the Catholic faith, we should try first to convince those within the faith. Similar to other areas of life in which we disagree with another, we tend to listen to those we like but refuse to listen to those we do not like. This tendency points to a reality: when we strive to convince another, political correctness and truth correctness take the backseat to emotional correctness. What is our emotional disposition when we discuss/debate critical issues? Are we humble; are we gentle? Do we communicate humility, gentleness and patience? If not, why then are we surprised that the other will not listen to us? My hope is that we not only love life, but also love the person with whom we are striving to share our beliefs and convictions.

There is hope. Abortion has declined from since its peak in 1990 with 1.49 million to 730,322 in 2011. Nevertheless, we ought not to tolerate even one innocent life to be killed; there is still much work to be done. It takes me about an hour to write this reflection; in this time, approximately 137 children have been killed by abortion. Please join me in praying for an end to abortion and find practical means to move our nation to a time when our society become abortion-free. Holy Mary, Mother of all the Unborn, pray for us.
